# **Effective Human Rights Law Teaching: Train the Teachers Course**

# **Context of the project**

The Norwegian Centre for Human Rights (NCHR) have been working with the New Bulgarian University (NBU) and the Bulgarian Ministry of Justice to build up the capacity of Bulgarian universities for the introduction of human rights legal education with practical orientation. In such cooperation, the Government Agent's Office at the Bulgarian Ministry of Justice, the Department of Law at the NBU, and the NCHR have undertaken a series of capacity building measures to ensure that international and European human rights law are taught effectively, by qualified academic staff, and with consideration to its domestic law dimension.

# Expert review of existing curricula

As part of the activity, NCHR experts carried out a review of the existing curricula. Through cooperation with the Bulgarian Ministry of Justice and the New Bulgarian University, they collected information from university management, academic staff and students, respectively. They also reviewed relevant documents and other sources. As a result, the team has drafted guidelines on the implementation of human rights in horizontal training (included in other disciplines) and vertical training (as a compulsory subject and/or specialised Master's program).

#### Introduction of human rights in the mandatory legal education

The Project actively advocated for the introduction of Human Rights as a compulsory study in the legal higher education curricula. That has become a fact in July 2022 with the passing of a new Ordinance on the Unified State Requirements for Acquisition of a Higher Education in Law.

#### Drafting of an model PhD program in Human Rights

Academic staff from the Norwegian Centre for Human Rights and the New Bulgarian University have drafted PhD courses for the establishment of an accredited human rights doctoral program at a Bulgarian university. Upon completion of the Project in April 2024, the program shall undertake its course to acquire accreditation before the competent Bulgarian national authority.









#### **Trainings of teachers**

Another key aspect of the project activity is the support to training initiatives aimed at strengthening the teaching capacity of the academia. Offered in this respect were short-term participations in study visits at the University of Oslo. These trainings are a logical continuation of ensuring mutual transfer of knowledge and teaching practices among Norwegian partners and their Bulgarian counterparts. As part of the training of teachers' component of the project, a one-week training was organized in Oslo with Bulgarian teachers on 25-29 September 2023. Two trainings are planned to be held in Sofia, respectively on 12-13 and 26-27 January 2024. These trainings are aimed at addressing various forms of teaching, quality assurance and student assessment, curriculum building, and experiential legal learning, especially legal clinics and human rights moot courts.

#### **Trainers/Speakers:**

Gentian Zyberi is a Professor of International Law and Human Rights at the Norwegian Centre for Human Rights. He has 20 years of professional experience in the field of international human rights law, international humanitarian law, and public international law. Professor Zyberi has been a member of the UN Human Rights Committee (2019-2022); member of the Permanent Court of Arbitration, the Netherlands (2016-2028); and Defense team member at the ICTY (2004-2012). He is a member of the Scientific Committee of the EU Fundamental Rights Agency for the period 2023-2028.

<u>Nina Reiners</u> is Associate Professor for Human Rights and Social Sciences at the University of Oslo. She is also affiliated as research associate with The Graduate Institute Geneva's Global Governance Centre. Her research was honoured with several awards, among them the Academic Council on the United Nations System (ACUNS) book award 2022 for her monograph "Transnational Lawmaking Coalitions for Human Rights."

Matthew Saul is Associate Professor of Law at the Norwegian Centre for Human Rights, Faculty of Law, University of Oslo. He publishes on aspects of general international law, international human rights law, and international adjudication. Saul is co-editor of International Law and Dispute Settlement: New Techniques and Problems (2010), International Law and Post-Conflict Reconstruction Policy (2015), and The International Human Rights Judiciary and National Parliaments (2017). His monograph Popular Governance of Post-Conflict Reconstruction: The Role of International Law was published by Cambridge University Press in 2014.









Janneke Gerards is professor of fundamental rights law at the Montaigne Centre for Rule of Law and Administration of Justice of Utrecht University (the Netherlands). She conducts research mainly in the fields of European fundamental rights, equal treatment law, judicial review and new technologies. In addition to her university work, among other things, she is an auxiliary Judge in the Appeals Court of The Hague, a member of the Scientific Committee of the EU Fundamental Rights Agency, and a substitute member of the Venice Commission.
